(Wisdom 1:1, 4-7, 12-15 & 2:23(CCL))

Reader: A reading from the Book of Wisdom.

Desire justice, you rulers of the earth! Remember the goodness of God. Seek God with integrity of heart.

A reading from Saint Paul's Second Letter to the Corinthians.

We want you to know, beloved, of the grace of God that has been given to the churches of Macedonia. In a severe test of affliction, the abundance of their joy and their profound poverty overflowed in a wealth of generosity on their part. According to their means, I can testify, and beyond their means, spontaneously, they begged us insistently for the favor of taking part in the service to the saints, an offering to the holy ones in need in Jerusalem.

Now, as you excel in every respect, in faith, discourse, knowledge, all earnestness, and in the love we have for you, may you excel in this gracious act also. You know the gracious act of Jesus the Christ, that, for our sake, he became poor although he was rich, so that by his poverty we might become rich.

If the eagerness is there, a gift is acceptable according to what one has, not according to what one does not have. Not that others should have relief while you are burdened! But, as a matter of equality, your surplus at the present time should supply their needs. And in their surplus, they will also supply your needs, that there may be equality.

As it is written: "Whoever had much did not have more, and whoever had little did not have less."

When Jesus had again crossed the Sea of Galilee in the boat to the other side, a great crowd gathered round him. He was by the lake when one of the leaders of the synagogue, named Jairus, came.

When he saw Jesus, he fell at his feet and begged him repeatedly: "My little daughter is at the point of death. Come! Lay your hands on her, so she

may be made well, and live."

Jesus went with Jairus. A large crowd followed and pressed in on Jesus. Now there was a woman who had been suffering from hemorrhages for twelve years. She had endured much, under many physicians, and had spent all that she had. She was no better, but rather grew worse. She had heard about Jesus.

She said to herself: "If I but touch his clothes, I will be made well." She came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak. Immediately, the bleeding stopped. She felt in her body that she was healed.

Immediately aware that power had gone forth from him, Jesus turned about in the crowd and said: "Who touched my clothes?"

His disciples said: "You can see the crowd pressing in on you. How can you say, 'Who touched me?'" Jesus looked all around to see who had done it. The woman, knowing what had happened to her, came to Jesus, trembling with fear. Falling down, she told him what she had done.

Jesus said to her: "Daughter, your faith has made you well. Go in peace. Be healed of this disease." While he was still speaking to her, some people came from Jairus' house to say to him: "Your daughter is dead. No need to trouble the teacher any further." But overhearing what they said, Jesus said to the leader of the synagogue: "Do not fear. Only believe."

When they came to the house, Jesus saw a commotion, With people weeping and wailing loudly. When he entered the house, he said to them: "Why do you make a commotion and weep? The child is not dead but sleeping."

They laughed at him, and then he ushered them all outside. He took the child's father and mother, and those who were with him, and went in where the child was. He took her by the hand and said to her, "'Talitha cum,' meaning:'Little girl, rise up!'"

Immediately, the girl rose up and began to walk about. She was twelve years of age. At this, her parents were overcome with amazement. Jesus strictly ordered them that no one should know this. He told them to give her something to eat.

For all who have died, that they may rest peacefully in the loving presence of our Creator; and may all who mourn the loss of loved ones be consoled, we pray:

That God may receive the unspoken prayers and intentions of our hearts; and we offer thanksgiving for prayers answered, we pray:

People Respond: God of All, hear our prayer.

Presider: God of the universe, You open your hand and fill all things with blessing. Grant us enough faith to trust in you and to love enough to do your will. And we offer this, our prayer, in Jesus' name.
