Liturgy of the Word

First Reading
A Reading from the Book of Exodus.
(Exodus 16:2-4, 12-18 (CCL))

Reader: A reading from the Book of Exodus.

The whole congregation of the Israelites complained against Moses and Aaron in the desert. The Israelites said to them, "If only God's hand had killed us in the land of Egypt, when we sat by meaty stews at night and ate our fill of bread. You've brought us out into this desert to kill this whole assembly with hunger!"

Then God said to Moses, "I am going to rain bread from heaven for you. Each day, the people will go out and gather enough for that day. In that way I will test them, whether they will trust in My ways or not. I have heard their grumbling. Tell them: 'In the evening twilight, you will eat meat. In the morning, you will have your fill of bread. Then you will know that I am your God.'"

In the evening, quail came and covered the camp. In the morning, there was a layer of dew all about the camp. When the layer of dew evaporated, fine flakes were on the surface of the desert floor, like frost. On seeing it, the Israelites asked one another, "What is this?"

They did not know what it was, but Moses told them, "It's the bread which God, our God, has given you to eat. And this is what God has commanded you: Gather as much of it as each person needs to eat, a bushel for each person, for as many of you as there are, each of you providing for those in your own tent."

The Israelites did as Moses told them. Some gathered a large amount, and some gathered a small amount. But when they measured it out by the bushel, the one who had gathered a large amount did not have too much, and the one who had gathered a small amount did not have too little. They gathered as much as each needed to eat.

Second Reading A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles. (Acts 20:4-12 (Incl Bible))

Reader: A reading from the Book of Acts.

After the feast of Unleavened Bread, we sailed from Philippi to Troas, which took 5 days. Upon arrival, we rejoined Sopater, from Beroea; Aristarchus and Secundus from Thessalonica, Gaius from Derbe, Timothy and Tychicus and Trophimus from Asia, all who had gone ahead of us and Waited for us in Troas, where we spent a week.

On the first day of the week, when we gathered to break bread, Paul spoke to them because he was going to leave the next day. He spoke at great length, even until midnight!

There were many lamps in the upstairs room where we were gathered. A young man named Eutychus, who was sitting on the window sill, was sinking into a deep sleep as Paul talked on and on.

When overcome by sleep, Eutychus fell out the window from the third story. When he was picked up, he was dead. Paul went down stairs to check on him and threw himself upon Eutychus, embraced him, and said to the others: "Don't be alarmed; there is life in him."

The boy lived, and those gathered were greatly comforted. Then Paul returned, back upstairs; he broke the bread, and they ate. Paul departed after a long conversation that lasted until daybreak.

Celebrant: May the Word of Christ be with you all.

People Respond: And also, with you. Celebrant: A reading from the Holy Gospel according to John.

People Respond: † Glory to you, O God.


When the people saw that neither Jesus nor the disciples were there, they got into their boats and crossed to Capernaum looking for Jesus. When they found Jesus on the other side of the lake, they said: "Rabbi, when did you get here?"

And Jesus answered them: "The truth of the matter is, you're not looking for me because you've seen signs, but because you've eaten your fill of the bread. You shouldn't be working for perishable food, but for life-giving food that lasts for all eternity. This, the Chosen One can give you, for the Chosen One."

At this, the people asked: "What must we do to perform the works of God?" And Jesus replied: "This is the work of God - to believe in the One whom God has sent."

And so they asked Jesus: "What signs are you going to give to show us that we should believe in you? What will you do? Our ancestors had manna to eat in the desert; ask scripture says, 'God gave them bread from heaven to eat."

Lector: For all who feel isolated, and for all who struggle in mind, body and spirit; that they may be healed, seen, heard and know they are not alone. With Mary of Magdala, we proclaim: People Respond: Christ is Risen!

Lector: For those who are sick. For those who struggle. For those who feel isolated and alone, and we pray especially for: Tammy, Paul, Peg, Stella, Sarah, and Bp. Frank. May they find peace and healing in God's gentle embrace. With Mary of Magdala, we proclaim: People Respond: Christ is Risen!

Lector: For all who have died, that they may rest peacefully in the loving presence of our Creator; and may all who mourn the loss of loved ones be consoled. With Mary of Magdala, we proclaim:

People Respond: Christ is Risen!

Lector: That God may receive the unspoken prayers and intentions of our hearts; and we offer thanksgiving for prayers answered. With Mary of Magdala, we proclaim:

People Respond: Christ is Risen!

Presider: Loving God, you made us in your image and we yearn for the healing of all your people. Fill our hearts with the fire of your love and our minds with the thirst for justice and peace. Embolden us to speak out against all forms of oppression, empower us to work for the coming of your reign, and enrich us with your life-giving Spirit so that all of creation may feel your touch and be healed. We ask this in Jesus' name.
